Adjective	A word that we use to describe a noun. Some adjectives: big, red, happy, fast.
Apostrophe	A <u>punctuation</u> mark. It shows who owns something. We use it like this: Tim's car It can show that letters are missing too. We use it like this: I am hungry = I'm hungry

	Capital letter	A special way of writing a <u>letter</u> at the start of a <u>sentence</u> or a name. Capital letters: A B C D E F G H I J K L M N O P Q R S T U V W X Y Z	
	Comma ,	A <u>punctuation</u> mark. It splits different parts of a <u>sentence</u> . It also shows you when to pause when you read out loud.	
	Compound word	A <u>word</u> made from two smaller words. class + room = classroom	



		A <u>word</u> that joins parts of a <u>sentence</u> together.	
	Conjunction	Some conjunctions: and, but, or, so, if, because	
		We use them like this: I got up and I ate an apple. He is tall but she is small. Is it red or is it green?	
		A <u>letter</u> that you use your lips, teeth or tongue to say out loud.	
	Consonant	Consonant letters: b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, q, r, s, t, v, w, x and z (and sometimes y)	



		A verb that is in the middle of happening.
	Continuous verb	It ends with -ing .
	VCID	We use it like this: I am playing He was eating.
		When you put two <u>words</u> together to make them shorter.
	Contraction	You take away some letters and put an <u>apostrophe</u> in their place.

	Exclamation	Something that is said loudly or with lots of emotion. It will end in an exclamation mark. It can be a whole sentence but it does not have to be. Some exclamations: Help! Stop being silly!
	Exclamation mark !	A <u>punctuation</u> mark. It shows that something is said loudly or with lots of emotion. We use it like this: Help me!
	Full stop	A <u>punctuation</u> mark. It goes at the end of a <u>sentence</u> . We use it like this: The monkey had a banana.

	Imperative verb	A <u>verb</u> that tells you what to do. We use it like this: Put on your socks. Sit on this chair.
	Letter	Letters make up the <u>words</u> that we write. Letters: a b c d e f g h i j k l m n o p q r s t u v w x y z
	Noun	A <u>word</u> for a person, place or thing. Some nouns: dog, park, rain, food



	A way to write <u>verbs</u> . It shows that something happened in the past.	
Past tense	Some past tense verbs: swam, ate, played, jumped	
	We use them like this: Yesterday, I swam in the pool.	
	A sound that you make when you speak. We put phonemes together to say <u>words</u> .	
Phoneme	Read this: rock	
THORIGING	We make three different sounds when we say it. It has three phonemes.

	When a <u>word</u> means more than one of a thing.
Plural	You often add the <u>letter</u> ' s ' to a <u>noun</u> to make it plural, but not always.
	Some plural words: trees, foxes, children, men
	A way to write <u>verbs</u> . It shows that something happens now or all the time.
Present Tense	Some present tense verbs: swim, eat, play, jump
	We use them like this: I swim in the pool.

	Suffix	Letters that you put at the end of a word to make a new word. We put the suffix -ing at the end of the word play to make playing .
	Verb	Sometimes called a 'doing word'. A word that describes an action. Some verbs: be, look, have, do, like, say
	Vowel	A <u>letter</u> that you do not use your lips, teeth or tongue to say out loud. Vowel letters: a, e, i, o and u (and sometimes y)
	Word	Words are made from <u>letters</u> . We use them to make <u>sentences</u> .
